Everett Frederick Sieckmann was born on 31 December 1928 at 5:55 a.m. either in Fillmore County, Nebraska<sup>1</sup> or in Alexandria, Thayer County, Nebraska.<sup>2</sup> He was the youngest child of Fred W. and Ruth E. Sieckmann nee Schafer. His parents were both 35 years of age when he was born. He had only one sibling, his brother, Leslie George Sieckmann, who was born in 1920. Everett was baptized as an infant on 07 July 1929 at the Ohiowa Methodist Church.<sup>3</sup> He died on 07 May 1997 at a nursing home in Moscow, Latah County, Idaho. His remains were transported back to Fillmore County, Nebraska for burial in the Ohiowa Public Cemetery. His funeral services and burial were held on 13 May 1997.4

As a child, he lived with his parents on the family farm in Fillmore County, Nebraska. Everett helped his father with farming as a young boy. They did not have all the modern conveniences that are available today. Everett used to help his dad plow using draft horses. As a child he did many unusual things. One day when he was only 2 or 3 years old he decided to climb to the top of the windmill. His mother noticed

that he was missing and began to look for him. There he was at the top of the windmill. This was quite a frightening experience for her as she was afraid he might fall or that the blades of the windmill would seriously injure or kill her little boy. Another time he decided he would like to sit on the wall near the ceiling. There was a nail in the wall for hanging a picture. Little Everett hung his small child's chair from the nail and climbed up to sit on the chair. There his mother found him sitting high upon the wall. When he was a bit older, it was a common sight to see him riding or standing on the backs of the cows or horses.



Not all of his time was spent thinking up unusual things to do. Like the other young children in rural Fillmore County, Everett attended a one-room school called District #9 for grades 1 through 8. After graduating from the 8<sup>th</sup> grade, he continued his education at Ohiowa High School for grades 9 through 12.5 Everett was valedictorian of the Class of 1946. Following graduation from high school, Everett attended Doane College in Crete, Saline County, Nebraska. He graduated from Doane College with a B.S. degree in chemistry, mathematics and physics in 1950.7 continued his education at Florida State University in Tallahassee, Florida, graduating in 1952 with an M.S. degree in physical chemistry. After completing his M.S. degree, he went to Ithaca, New York to study at Cornell University for his Ph.D. degree. He earned his doctorate degree in theoretical physics in 1960.8



Everett accepted a position of assistant professor of physics at the University of Kentucky in Lexington. He taught there from 1957 to 1962. He then was hired by the University of Idaho in Moscow, Idaho to teach physics as an associate professor. In 1967 he was promoted to full professor and he continued to teach physics at the University of Idaho until his retirement in 1988.9

Everett had many interests besides physics and chemistry. During the summer months he enjoyed camping, hiking and backpacking in the mountains of Idaho. He owned burros, which he used to help with backpacking.
